#### Kit 4 Kids

In early May – a little later than usual due to our Afghan Cricket Aid adventure – we launched our annual Summer Kit Appeal. Since October 2009 we have, with the support of British Airways, taken over three tons – and counting! – of clothing and equipment to Mumbai. To this end, August brought further news of our fly/cover drive partnership with British Airways with confirmation from their Community Investment Team of our nine bags (200kgs) for Mumbai this autumn. It was with renewed vigour then that we set out on a busy month of kit collections.

In early August we embarked on a ten hour (360 mile) road trip taking us to Leeds, Newcastle and Newark before finally unloading the van at base camp in Lincoln. Peter Mason (pictured opposite) is a long-time supporter of PFF along with fellow members of The Forty Club. As much as the light roller would be a welcome addition to the *mali's* equipment at the Gymkhana in Matunga we opted – in light of the welfare of the baggage handlers at both Heathrow and in Mumbai – to leave it behind. Sincere thanks to Peter and The Forty Club for their continued support of PFF.





The pursuit of clothing and equipment has taken PFF far and wide in the last nine years including road trips to Cardiff, Canterbury, Truro, London, Worcester, Manchester, Nottingham, Leeds and Derby. In early August we added to this with a visit to Ian Wardle (pictured opposite) in Newcastle. The Northumberland Cricket Board had been a key contributor to our Afghan Cricket Aid adventure in March, but this was the first time we had had the chance to visit Ian. With rain and several hours back down the A1 in prospect, it was the shortest of visits. More than enough time, however, to thank Ian for his valued support. Not that our day was over, as we gladly kept our coffee and kit appointment with Steve Archer and the Yorkshire Cricket Board on the outskirts of Leeds.

The key to all donations of clothing and kit is size: small is best. To this end, our wish list can be divided into two:

Dharavi Cricket Academy: bats, balls, pads, gloves, thigh pads, arm guards, helmets and plastic wicket sets.

Rural Schools Initiative: anything Kwik Kricket or All Stars Cricket related – plastic wicket sets, bats, wind balls, and ultra-light pads and gloves.

The kit opposite arrived courtesy of Kim Price and our friends at the Surrey Cricket Board. This will form part of the small kit packages destined for communities in and around Maharashtra as part of our Rural Schools Initiative.



#### Old Trafford Fundraiser


